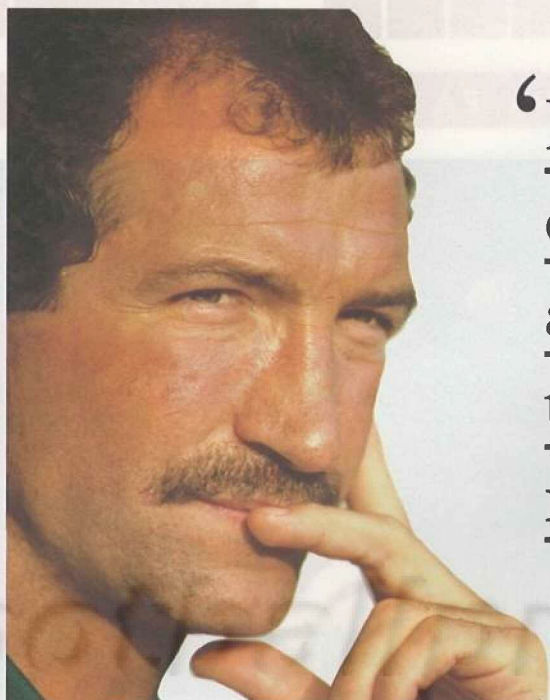

# SOUNESS

**I**t was one year and two days ago when French club Auxerre came to Anfield with a 2-0 lead in a UEFA Cup second-leg game and I wrote . . .

"We have left ourselves with a mountain to climb tonight but the task is not impossible."

Yes, we remember it well. We won 3-0 against all the odds as Anfield throbbed with atmosphere and excitement. Supporters were still recalling the incidents of that heady evening after the season had ended.

Tonight, we have our backs to the wall again after losing 4-2 to Moscow Spartak in the first leg of a Cup Winners' Cup tie.

And we firmly believe that success can be achieved, despite the disappointments we suffered in the rain and sleet of Russia. The players will be properly prepared, we have no doubts about that.

Again, I refer to the words I offered before the Auxerre game . . ." They should feel like bolting from the dressing-room door to take advantage of this second chance. They should be in a state of mind where they can barely wait for the referee to start the game."

Our fans will hardly need reminding of the vital part they played, either. They were magnificent against Auxerre and a repeat performance from them tonight will help us scale that mountain.

They are knowledgeable people and will, without doubt, appreciate the dangers of trying to close on a two-goal margin. We must be disciplined at all times. We cannot launch all-out attacks and run the grave risk of conceding goals.

An early strike would be a tremendous boost for us, of course, but we have to exercise patience, too, over the whole duration of the game.

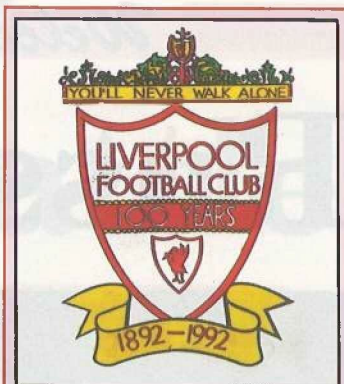
We are not looking for sympathy, either, after twice coming from behind in Russia then shaping for a win with the score at 2-2. Mistakes were made but that football match is over . . . another is about to begin.

Thousands of our supporters would see that first leg on television and the impressive way in which our youngsters handled a situation they had never known before. They grasped the nettle and will feel more comfortable here at Anfield tonight.

To claw back two goals from the Russian champions and concede none in the process is a tall order for any team. It will require a superhuman effort and I believe it can be done.

We had a good opportunity to discourage the Russians in the first leg, but it wasn't taken. We had also picked up our tempo in previous games. But there is no point in feeling sorry for ourselves . . . the job in hand is the essential one.

I relish the prospect of another big European night when team and supporters come together in a manner which is special to this club.

# Russia's Finest

SPARTAK'S goalkeeper Stanislav Cherchesov, the man who has to keep Liverpool at bay tonight, has been eagerly looking forward to his first visit to Anfield.

"I could not have wished for a better Cup Winners' Cup draw," says the 29-year-old. "Liverpool are one of the most famous clubs in the world and the atmosphere at their ground is bound to be electric.

"Although the choice is limited on Russian television, I like to watch English teams in action. Football in England is often quite different to that played in other countries.

"The game is more powerful and faster and the ball is in the air a lot." Cherchesov, who has to keep Liverpool from scoring at least twice, added: "This will be a difficult test for me."

In 1990 he was voted Russia's top keeper because of his agility and sharp reflexes. But coming off his line for crosses is not his strong point.

He has won 11 international caps and went to the European Championships as No 2 keeper for the Commonwealth of Independent States last summer. Since 1987 he has been Spartak's first choice. The 22-year-old Lithuanian Gintaras Stauche is his deputy.

The strength of Spartak, newly crowned as champions and Russia's finest club, is impressive.

In front of Chercherov is an all-international back four. At right back is the accomplished Andrei Chernishov, aged 24, who signed from Moscow Dynamo last year and went on to play in all of his country's three games in Euro 92.

His usual partner is 25-year-old Andrei Ivanov, who has graduated

## Keeper who loves Anfield says 'It will be difficult'

from the Spartak youth ranks to win four CIS caps. He is also capable of performing in midfield.

Central defence is occupied by uncompromising Georgian Kakhaber Tchadadze, 24, and his 21-year-old partner, Dimitri Khlestov, another youth policy product who has gone on to win three international caps.

Hard man Tchadadze, who did not play in the first leg, began his career at Dynamo Tbilisi and recently returned to Moscow after a spell in Swedish football. The team's defensive cover is normally provided by Yevgeny Bushmanov, 21, and Dimitri Gradilenko, 23.

Spartak are likely to pack their midfield with five men tonight, with 24-year-old CIS star Igor Lediakhov, providing the brains and workhorse Valery Karpin the energy. They shared three of the goals in the 4-2 win in Moscow.

They are likely to be supported by another two recently signed internationals, the combative Viktor Onopko, 23, and 25-year-old Andrei Piatnitski, whose strong runs from deep have to be watched closely. There may also be a place for 33-year-old veteran Fyodor Cherenkov, holder of 40 caps, twice Soviet Player of the Year in the 80s, and still an influential character.

Spartak's lone front man will be 22-year-old Dimitri Radchenko, the slender striker who drew out Bruce Grobbelaar for that fateful penalty in Moscow. He made a sensational debut in Europe for the club in March last year - just three months after joining them from Zenit Leningrad.

It happened in a European Cup quarter-final return leg in Spain, with Real Madrid strong favourites to beat Spartak after holding them

to a goalless draw in Moscow. Spartak's preparations had also been hit by the Russian winter.

Although Radchenko was a comparatively raw youngster, coach Oleg Romantsev opted to gamble on his speed and eye for goal. And although Emilio Butragueno gave Real an early lead, Radchenko scored twice before half-time to set up a shock 3-1 win.

The drama did not end there. A few days later it emerged that Radchenko had not been qualified for the tie because he had signed for Spartak after the UEFA transfer deadline.

However, because Real had failed to make a protest within 24 hours of the game, the result was allowed to stand and Radchenko remained the ineligible hero.

Spartak's other forwards can look forward to nothing better than a summons from the substitutes' bench tonight. Mikhail Rusayev, a summer purchase from the German Second Division club Oldenburg, got such a call in the second half of the first leg against Liverpool, taking the place of 18-year-old Vladimir Beschastnikh.

## The man in charge of the champions

THE club's 38-year-old coach, Oleg Ivanovic Romantsev, is a Moscow Spartak man through and through.

A full Soviet international on ten occasions, Romantsev was a formidable centre-back for Spartak and helped them win the Soviet League in 1979.

On hanging up his boots, he took charge of Second Division Krasnaya Pressiya and later joined Spartak coaching staff.

In 1989 he replaced Konstantin Beskov as first-team boss and successfully built a side which reached the semi-

finals of the 1991 European Cup.

"Our team which progressed to the last-four of the Champions' Cup in 1991 cannot be compared with the present Spartak side," says Romantsev.

"During the past year or so we have lost many key players to foreign clubs and it is difficult to replace talented performers like Igor Shalimov, Alexander Mostovoi and Vasili Kulkov.

"We have a number of promising youngsters, but, of course, their international experience is limited. We are rebuilding a new team."



# How they made their name

MOSCOW Spartak began their life as a team with an identity crisis.

Founded in 1922 as the Moscow Sports Club, the side's name was then changed on no fewer than four occasions before officials settled on the title of Moscow Spartak in 1935.

The man behind the rebirth of Spartak was new club president Nikolai Starostin, an ex-captain of the Soviet National team who had played for the Moscow Sports Club alongside his brothers – Alexander, Andrei and Piotr.

It was Starostin's idea to name the club after Spartacus, the leader of the slave revolt in Ancient Rome. He wasted no time in developing Spartak into one of the giants of Soviet football.

Backed by the trade union for producers' co-operatives, Spartak – or The Shopkeepers as they were

nicknamed – have enjoyed consistent success.

They won the first of their 12 USSR League titles in 1936 and have also lifted the domestic Cup a record ten times. Spartak, competing in the recently-reformed Russian championship, have just become the first club to claim the new crown.

Starostin has devoted his entire life to the Spartak cause and suffered greatly for his loyalty to the club. Their victories were deeply resented by the Soviet secret police – whose team was city rivals, Moscow Dynamo. The notorious KGB chief of the early post-war years, Lavrenty Beria, went to extreme lengths to have Starostin arrested and sent to Siberia. He spent 12 years in a labour camp, but at 89, he continues to follow Spartak.

Their best performance came in

the 1990-91 European Cup. Napoli and Real Madrid were beaten en route to a semi-final appearance. But French champions, Olympique Marseille, dashed Russian hopes with a 5-2 aggregate win.

No longer able to count on cash subsidies from trade union benefactors or the State, Spartak have secured their financial future through sponsorship firms from Japan, France and South Korea.

But they have been unable to match the salaries on offer at Western clubs and in the past year captain Vasili Kulikov and schemer Alexander Mostovoi have moved to Benfica, while midfield general Igor Shalimov is with Inter Milan.

Despite the exodus they provided six players to the CIS squad at Euro 92 – Chernishov, Tchadadze, Cherchesov, Onopko, Lediakov and Ivanov.

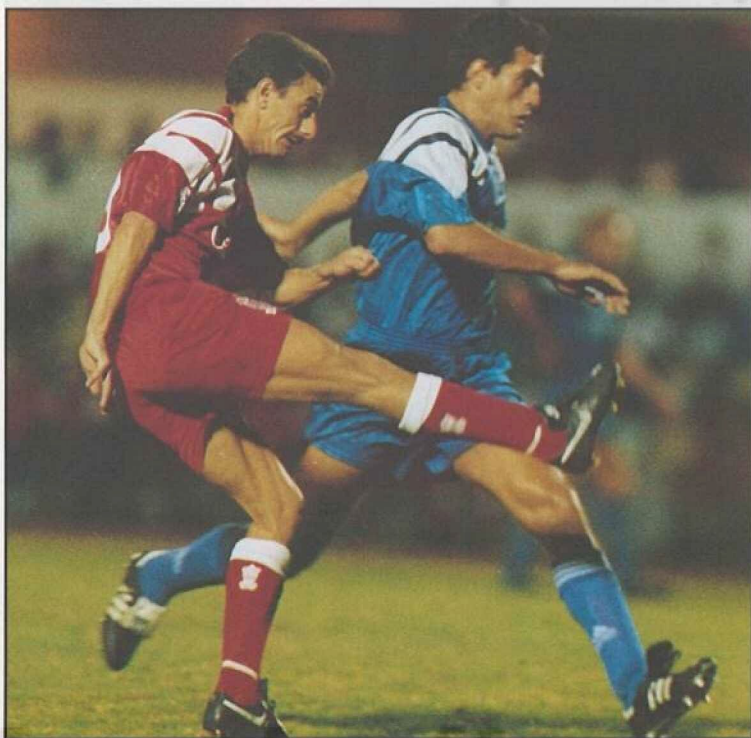
The pencil-thin winger fooled everyone, cutting in from the left and shooting left-footed between goalkeeper and the near post when he was expected to cross.

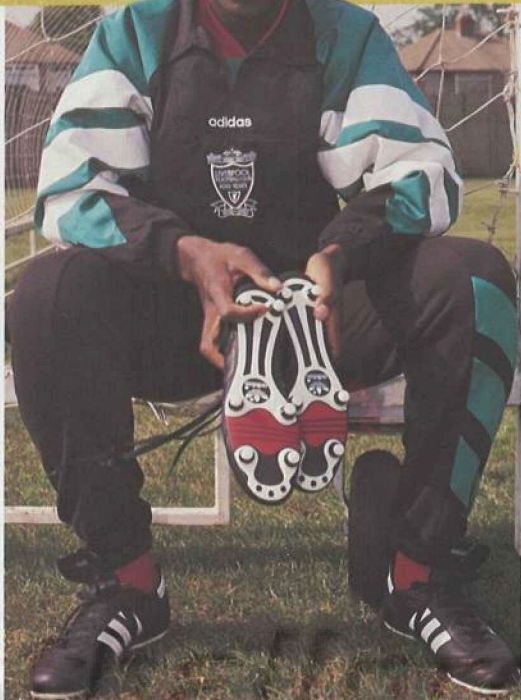

# What's a record between friends!

Jamie did not let the side down

■ Verdict on Jamie's debut as it appeared in the Review on November 6, 1991.

IT was one of Jamie Redknapp's pals who took away his record of being the youngest player ever to represent Liverpool in European football.

Jamie made his debut last season against Auxerre of France in the first leg of a second-round UEFA Cup tie. It was October 23, 1991 and he was 18 years and four months.

But he held the distinction for less than a year. Enter Phil Charnock, a mere 17-year-old, who came on as substitute against Apollon Limassol at Anfield on September 16.

He made a good impression, playing on the left of midfield. Phil also travelled to Cyprus for the return leg, where he and Jamie enjoyed each other's company, although Phil did not get a call from the substitutes' bench this time.

Phil, who was spotted with Rufford Colts, attended the club's School of Excellence as a 12-year-old and has since progressed through the ranks.

"The nerves jangled while I sat on the bench during the first Apollon game, but drained away when I was called up for the last half-hour," he admits.

"I was always a Liverpool supporter. It gave me a feeling of great pride when I ran on to the pitch. I felt a bit overawed at first, though, with well-known players around me."

Phil was chosen for the Coca-Cola Cup-tie against Chesterfield at Anfield and was substituted at half-time. "The team needed someone with more experience," he explains maturely.

"I understood that. But I have tasted big-time football and when chances come along, I will grab them. I have learned a lot already from travelling with the first team."

He had one prize possession

before joining the Liverpool staff . . . a John Barnes autograph. "I was not an autograph hunter as a schoolboy, but a friend gave it to me. He knew that John was my favourite player."

The vital qualifying match for the European Championships takes place at G-Mex, Manchester, next Wednesday.

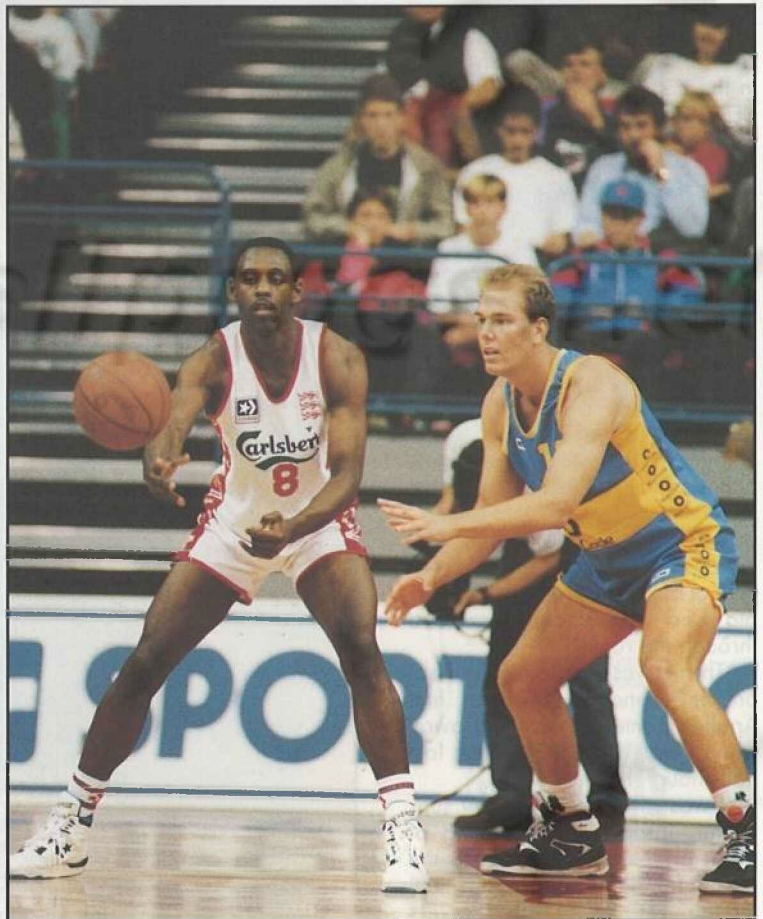

# Harry

FOOD specialist Harry Wight has made his contribution to the Liverpool success story while the players have been asleep.

The experienced hotelier has accompanied the team on more than 50 European trips and has not had one upset stomach to report.

For him, though, the kick-off comes at the crack of dawn when he moves into a foreign kitchen and mingles with the staff reporting for early duty. He makes a careful inspection of the food and prepares the day's menus with the resident chef.

Harry, an affable, 52-year-old Scot, knows his business . . . and the regular drill laid down by the club's coaching staff.

"The players do not touch exotic dishes," he says. "Their tastes vary between steak and fish, chicken and veal or pasta. They know the rules as well as myself and nobody has stepped out of line."

His near-20-year association with Liverpool began in Ireland, where Harry was operations manager in a leading Hotel. "The team had stayed with us and all had gone smoothly, then out of the blue I was invited to attend Anfield before a League game against Coventry City," he recalls.

Talks were arranged with manager Bob Paisley and his lieutenants Joe Fagan and Ronnie Moran. They decided that he was the right man for the job.

He smiles when he looks back on his early days when Liverpool played clubs behind the Iron Curtain.

"We had taken our own refrigerated food to an hotel in Bulgaria and seen it stored in a suitable unit," he says. "It was the following morning when the trouble began.

"I was down in the kitchen early and was greeted by one old lady who could not speak English.

## He makes sure the Reds can stomach the fight

"Despite all my appeals she wouldn't provide the key for me to open the door and reach the food.

It may have been a planned disruption, but that did not concern me. The players had to be fed and all I could see was empty plates.

My constant appeals for the keys were ignored, so I picked up a meat cleaver and began to rip at the lock. I had no other choice . . . the lads had a very important game ahead of them and needed their nourishment."

The keys soon arrived and breakfast was served. On a lighter note, he tells of a European Cup

game at Tblisi, in Georgia, then still part of the Soviet Union, and a burly chef who wanted to bridge the gap between East and West at six o'clock in the morning.

"I was confronted with a bottle of brandy, a bottle of vodka, a bottle of whisky and a bottle of red wine. With a little persuasion, I settled for a taste of red wine and good will was preserved"

He left that chef with a rare recipe, too . . . the secret of poaching three eggs in Ray Clemence style!

Goalkeeper Ray had nothing else for his pre-match meal and

they had to be done to his liking. "The chef had never seen them done before and watched in wonder as they wobbled to the surface of the water.

"He insisted that I cook three for him, too, and he approved after eating them. We became good friends."

Harry had been a Liverpool admirer long before he was invited to Anfield. Working with the staff and players has strengthened the bond.

He studied at a catering college in Scotland and gained vast hotel experience and food knowledge during travels in Ireland, Scotland and England.

"Fish dishes are my speciality, but any taste, any good flavour excites my taste buds," he reveals. "I have been privileged to see great Liverpool teams. They have been a pleasure to serve.

The threat of missing the next round in Moscow against Spartak was hard to bear for the club's most consistent traveller.

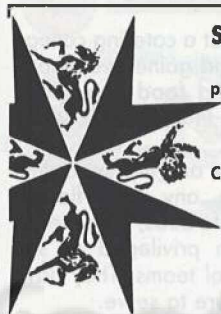
"Persistence won the day for me," he says. "Fortunately I was able to organise a new one and apply for a visa."

"I saw the great Bill Shankly step from the team coach and everything went quiet, such was the charisma of the man. He began to talk and everyone listened.

"Then the game started and I heard those Liverpool supporters singing. I wanted to join them."

Today Jim the tax man is a fully accepted and easily recognised supporter. He is a six-footer and weighs more than 20 stones. His humour is appreciated, too.

He remembers his long-time favourite and friend, Kenny

Dalglish, promising to leave him a ticket at the ground. When he arrived, there was nothing in the name of Jim Gardiner.

"Is it addressed to 'Big Jim'?" he asked. The ticket was there . . . and no one doubted his identity.

The cost of his travels would raise many an eyebrow among the nation's best supporters. Jim watches his team both home and away, in all European games, and even pre-season tours.

Guess who stood out in the crowd when Sammy Lee had his testimonial match in Osasuna, Spain, before Liverpool's current

reserve-team coach returned to England . . . Big Jim.

"I dread to think what I have paid out to watch the Reds," he grins.

"It has simply become a way of life and, whatever the expense, it has been worth while."

Even as a teenager in Edinburgh he attended Anfield games when he could. "I persuaded friends with cars to drive down," he recalls. Later he was able to plan his own transport and timetables. And in the late Seventies he moved from the Kop to the status of season-ticket holder.

"My best memories are from the 1984 European Cup Final win in Rome, which went to a penalty shoot out. But the FA Cup Final win against Everton two years later was very special, too."

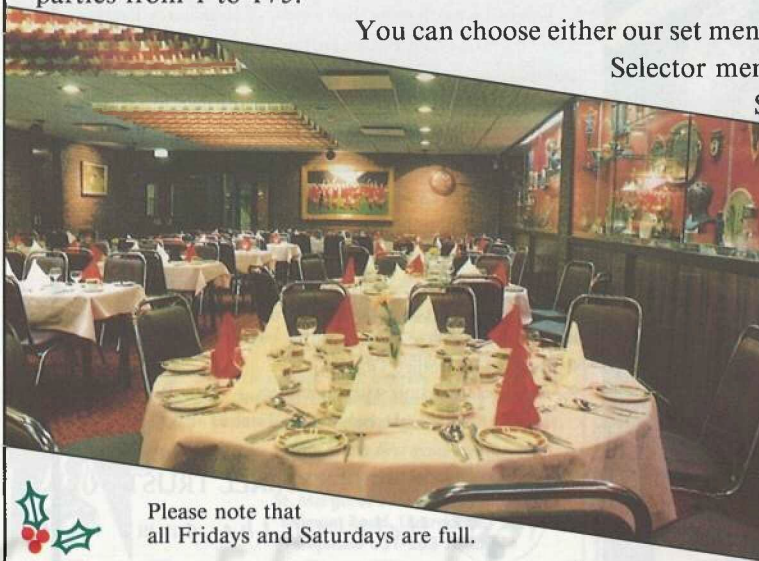
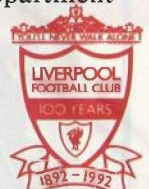

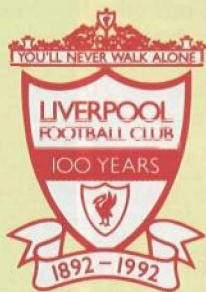


## Greeks wearing gifts

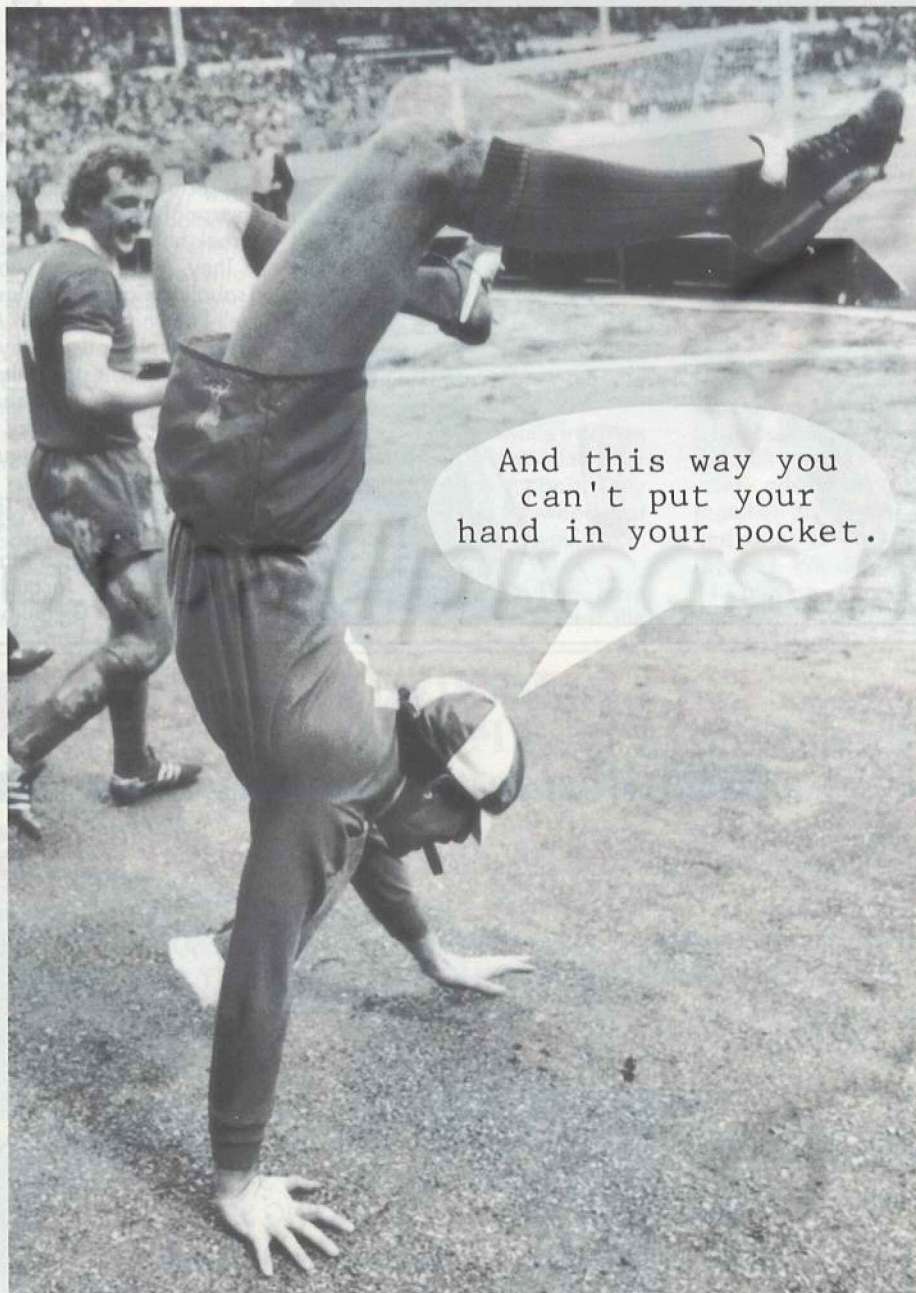

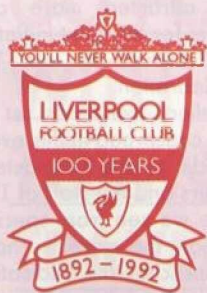
