SPACE SOCCER LAUNCH!

Technical gremlins permitting, our UEFA Cup-tie second round, first leg with Moscow Spartak will be screened for you live here at the Leisure centre to give the club yet another historic 'First'.

The film will not be 'From Russia With Love'. Nor will it be 'From Russia With Roubles'. The match pictures will arrive from Russia with the aid of a specially hired and located receiver dish beamed in to the Soviet Satellite in Outer Space.

The decision to go ahead with what is clearly a slightly risky experiment was taken, despite all its inherent problems, in keeping with the club's aim and ambition to provide every possible service to supporters who deserve it.

When the second round draw was made and it was clear that very, very few fans would be able to make the trip our first reaction was: 'What a pity more will not be able to see it'.

Our second reaction was to recall that a TV technician who lives at Bromsgrove has just such a receiver at his home and regularly watches programmes from the Eastern Bloc via Satellite.

RUSSIAN REPORT

BY VILLA SCOUT MALCOLM BEARD

Aston Villa seek a satisfying result behind the Iron Curtain tonight aided by the soccer scout who has helped the club to European success in the past.

Malcolm Beard will hopefully be among the audience along with virtually the entire club staff, watching to see if the report he gave to manager Tony Barton brings the right rewards.

Beard was in the giant 90,000 Lenin stadium last Friday night watching Spartak play Dzalgiris Vilnius.

However today's game has been switched to the smaller Dynamo stadium so on Saturday Beard went there to watch them play Dynamo Minsk in the 50,000 seater venue.

As a result of his fact finding trip he has been able to supply details of the journey, the atmosphere in Moscow, the weather, the team and the venue. And of course, the food.

First of all, players to watch:

Goalkeeper DASSAYEV is known in Russia as the new Lev Yashin, a compliment that says it all.

Midfielder BOULNOV is a dependable anchor man who is powerful going forward

Right back SOCHNOV has been transferred to defence from attack and has retained his aggressive tendencies. Although he is billed as being a right-sided defender he in fact pushed forward to a midfield role and is known to attack from there.

CHERENKOV is an attacking midfield player with a growing reputation in Russia's international side having starred in the 2-0 win over Poland which virtually assured his country a place in the European Championship Finals.

KUZNETSOV is a 22-year-old midfield player who also has a great deal of skill and will be one for Villa to watch.

Striker RODIONOV made his international debut as substitute in the Soviet's 4-1 win over Hungary in August 1980.

Their star player is probably GAVRILOV, aged 30 with twenty-seven caps. He played in all five Soviet games in the 1982 World Cup Finals.

He was second top scorer in the Russian League last season and has currently scored 18 this term. At the end of August this year he became one of the few players to have scored 100 goals in the Russian First Division.

In the first round return of this

season UEFA Cup he scored four of his side's goals against HJK in Helsinki.

What else did Malcolm glean from his Euro-mission?

Firstly, the team's journey will not have been as exhausting a journey as when they faced Dynamo Kiev. The flight from Heathrow to Moscow is approximately a four hour jaunt, little more tiring than a coach trip to the North-East.

Once in Russia, however, the atmosphere is strictly non-Western. Sombre by our standards and strictly not for laughs.

As for the food, they will by now be more than grateful for the hampers of English produce they humped with them on the 1,500 mile journey.

In those hampers there is tea and sugar, breakfast cereals, chocolate, bacon and eggs and many other familiar items from a normal English diet.

Said Beard: 'It seems that cattle and other animals for eventual slaughter are fed on some sort of whale food. This explained to me why it was that everything seemed to taste like fish.

'The first meal I asked for was meat but not only did it taste like fish it smelled like it, too. Needless to say I couldn't eat it. In those circumstances you would soon yearn for home cooking.

The weather is, well, cold. Villa's European travellers have found that the top coats supplied by Foster Menswear for the purpose were not

needed in Portugal because it was too warm.

Now, in Russia a far heavier garment is needed. If Villa get through to round three both the players and Fosters Menswear will hope to be blessed with an in-between climate!

Treatment of visitors to Russia is formally hospitable though not warmly welcoming as here in Aston.

Malcolm was fortunate in finding a kindred spirit in a Spartak coach named Ivanov (what else!) who looked after him when he needed it and, wonder of wonders, spoke perfect English. Well not PERFECT but better than Malcolm's Russian...

Playing style is calculated, tactics are considered and slightly clockwork, but individual skills are finely tuned and impressive.

'They tend to look rather casual and slow in their build up but when they break forward they get plenty of men up. Technically they are very sound and mostly they look comfortable and at ease on the ball in an unhurried sort of way.

'They are very efficient in possession and pass the ball around well. The system they adopt seems to give them time and space. They never give the impression of being crowded but that, of course, is when they are up against a side who play much the same as themselves.'

Now he has come in from the cold would he stick his neck out on a forecast? 'It's possible that the way we play, especially at Villa Park, will shake them out of their normal composed style.

'Obviously the key is the first leg. We mustn't be impatient in Moscow. If we play as we all know Villa can then I believe we can do it.'

FOR YOUR LEISURE

The staging of the link-up from behind the Iron Curtain at the Aston Villa Leisure Centre is another indication of both its endless uses and of the increasing co-operation between the Asda venue and the parent club. It's well worth a reminder of the activities which have been staged here: Championship Boxing, Wrestling, The Davenports Bullets Basketball matches, International Volleyball, International King's Cup tennis. International Judo, International Badminton, Marching bands, five-a-side football and almost every other conceivable activity. Perhaps even more important is the community involvement which the extensive facilities create. There is an unemployed programme where out-of-work folks can carry out any activity of their choice on two days a week for just 25 pence. Also there is a summer scheme for schoolchildren and can go all day for various sports and games at prices ranging from 15 to 30p per day. There is a membership of more than one thousand for squash and badminton whilst one hundred teams play regularly in five-a-side leagues here of which the Aston Villa Travellers are one. In addition there is a thriving women's five-a-side league based at Asda, perhaps the only one of its kind in the country. Not a bad variety of worthwhile events all under one roof. Yet it doesn't end even there. The Leisure Centre has become an increasingly important part of the club's sponsorship package. The facilities available allow for sponsoring companies to stage an indoor sporting occasion in conjunction with a matchday sponsorship and also to entertain on the premises, just a short distance from Villa Park. It's a super kind of partnership

when both sides are winners.
